

## 4-H EXHIBITS

- A. Exhibitors must be 4-H members in Calloway County. Membership records will be checked.
- B. All exhibits must be of work done during 2009-2010 project year.
- C. Fair Management, 4-H Council, or others connected with the fair will not be responsible in case of accident or loss.
- D. **Entries will be received from 1:30 a.m. to 4:00, Saturday, June 12<sup>th</sup>.** Produce will not be returned to exhibitor.
- E. Entries must be checked out between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., Monday, June 21<sup>st</sup>.
- F. Judging will begin on Saturday, June 12<sup>th</sup>. Exhibit hall will be cleared before judging will begin.
- G. Decisions of judges will be final.
- H. Only 1 entry in each class permitted.
- I. All entries will be judged on the Danish System. Each entry will receive a blue, red, or white ribbon. Ribbon premiums will be determined according to X value.
- J. Class champions will be named & ribbons awarded. No premiums will be paid for the champion.
- K. Anyone who removes their exhibits from the 4-H area before Saturday, June 19<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 p. m. will forfeit their fair check.

### LOT 6011.2 4-H Dog Poster Contest

Posters should encourage the participant's imagination in developing a slogan/theme that promotes a breed or project or educates the viewer about a dog project related activity. Examples of topics include but are not limited to: showing/grooming/caring for your dog, dog health, nutrition, and breed characteristics. Posters should be simple and focus on one message.

Participants may use a variety of media, however no 3-dimensional posters will be allowed.

Posters must be no smaller than 20" x 30" and no larger than 24"x 30." Posters can be made using matt board, foam core, or corrugated board.

Copyrighted characters such as Snoopy, Charlie Brown, or other cartoon characters can not be used.

Label 4LO-11S0 should be affixed to the lower right corner of the poster. The back of the poster MUST include a listing of the source of the information on the front of the poster or the poster will be disqualified.

Posters will be judged on how well they present information and on their general appearance.

Class champion ribbons will be presented. All participants will receive ribbons and premiums.

### LOT 6015 - 4-H HORTICULTURE & PLANT SCIENCE

All plants exhibited MUST have been grown by the 4-Hers for **at least 6 months**. Exceptions will be made with terrariums, dish gardens and annual and vegetable bucket gardens which may have been grown for a shorter period of time.

Exhibits entered with pesticide residue will be disqualified and disposed of.

Care will be provided for all plants. However, because of low light, air conditioning, etc., no guarantee can be made that the plants will be returned in their original condition. Plants are

entered at the risk of the exhibitor.

Vegetable entries should be fresh, with the label on top of exhibit. Do not stick toothpicks in produce.

Securely attach the 4-H Identification Card (4LO-11SO) to the exhibit in a location which can be seen by the public once the item is placed or displayed. Attach neatly with tape; punch a hole in the corner of the ID tag and attach with a string or rubber band; or attach card to a floral pick and insert in the pot.

561 **Environmental Awareness** (such as, but not limited to). A one-page description of project must accompany entry item (typed or printed neatly) to be eligible for entry.

A. Tree planting on city property, roadways, parks, etc.

B. Home landscaping

C. Composting trees, shrubs, greenhouse crops or garden perennials.

562 **Production and Marketing** (such as but not limited to:)

A. Vegetable garden planted for home and/or market use.

Plant Display: Youth should NOT use garden soil in containers. Use well-drained, disease-free potting soil for all containers.

### Garden and/or Orchard Displays

571 The exhibitor may exhibit as many different fruits and/or vegetables from their garden as desired. Any size or type (minimum of five types) of produce may be displayed in the 2'x3' area provided for each exhibit. The exhibit must be in a display container (box or basket) which can be easily moved. Vegetables will not be returned to exhibitor. They will be judged as follows:

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Attractiveness of Container	30%	30%
Uniformity and true-to-type ness	10%	10%
Number of different types	15%	15%
Labeling	5%	

4-H'ers may also exhibit plates of vegetables. A white paper plate for vegetables must be supplied by the exhibitor. These vegetables will not be returned to the exhibitor. Classes of vegetables will be limited to:

- 572 **Tomato** (5 per plate) Must be ripe (red or yellow color only)
- 573 **Peppers**, hot, bell, sweet (5 per plate)
- 574 **Cucumbers**, slicing (5 per plate), pickling (5 per plate)
- 575 **Beans**, snap or lima (12 per plate)
- 576 **Corn**, sweet (in the husk with silks) (5 ears per plate)
- 577 **Cantaloupe** (1 whole), halved

Entries shall be on an individual basis and must be produced by the exhibitor. Each grade shall consist of two hands of 20 leaves each and samples entered in Classes 6 through 10 shall not be considered for this class. An engraved plaque will be awarded to the 4-H individual exhibiting the most

outstanding entry in classes 6 through 10 and 18. In case of a tie, a point system will be used in awarding plaques. Only **one** entry per individual is permitted and an entry shall consist of four grades:

- 10 Tip (Leaf 16 inches or under)

**All 4-H Dark Tobacco should be entered as Division 2102.**

Entries shall be on an individual basis and must be produced by the exhibitor. One entry per individual is permitted and an entry shall consist of four grades: Wrappers, Heavy Brown Leaf, Dark Leaf, and Thin Brown Leaf. Samples entered in classes 19 through 29 shall not be considered for this division.

**Grain and Hay Classes**

Grain samples must be of good quality and free from foreign matter. The Superintendent has the authority to refuse any and all entries due to excess chaff, rodent pellets, mold, musty, foreign materials, or anything that makes is unsuitable for display. Do not bring grains in glass containers. **Grain must be in one (1) gallon zip lock bags.** Neither the container nor the grain will be returned.

Bring ½ hay bale securely bound with cord or twine. **Place ½ hay bale in a large double strength garbage bag.**

Legume hay shall consist of 85% if the class designed legume. Grass hay shall be 85% of the class-designed grass. Mixed hay should contain only one eligible grass and one eligible legume. The legume component shall be at least 30% alfalfa and not more than 70% legume. Eligible legumes are alfalfa, red clover, and ladino clover. Eligible grasses are timothy, Bermuda grass, orchard grass, tall fescue and rye grass. Roots of soybeans must be washed.

### Legume Hay

- 600 Alfalfa hay, ½ bale (no full bales accepted) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.
- 601 Red clover hay, ½ bale (no full bales accepted) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.

### Grass Hay

- 602 Timothy Hay, ½ bale (**no full bales accepted**) from this current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled. **Place hay in a double strength plastic bag.**
- 603 Other Grass Hay, ½ bale (**no full bales accepted**) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled. **Place hay in a double strength plastic bag.**

### Mixed Hay

- 604 Mixed Hay, ½ bale (**no full bales accepted**) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.

### Yellow Corn

- 605 Yellow-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 606 Yellow-ear, from the current year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 607 Yellow-shelled, from the previous year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

### White Corn

- 608 White-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 609 White-ear, from the current year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 610 White-shelled, from the previous year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

### Popcorn

- 611 White Popcorn-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 612 Red Popcorn-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.
- 613 Yellow Popcorn-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

### Field Soybeans (Oil)

- 614 Soybeans from the current year's crop, three stalks tied together below leaves, with roots intact, but free of soil, and labeled to show variety.
- 615 Soybeans from the previous year's crop, 1-gallon zip lock bag, and labeled to show variety and yield.

### Grain Sorghum (Milo)

- 617 Grain Sorghum from the current year's crop, three stalks tied together below leaves, with roots intact, but free of soil, and labeled to show variety.
- 618 Grain Sorghum from the previous year's crop, 1-gallon zip lock bag, and labeled to show variety and yield.

### Sweet Sorghum

- 619 Sweet sorghum from the current year's crop, three stalks tied together below leaves, with roots intact, but free of soil, and labeled to show variety.

### Wheat (soft, red, winter)

- 620 Wheat from the current year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

- 621 Barley from the current year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

### LOT 6021 – 4-H ELECTRIC

1. Exhibits must be made according to the instructions in the 4-H project book.
2. One exhibit per youth per class.
3. All exhibits requiring bulbs must have the correct size.
4. Use of molded plug-ins is discouraged.
5. No cord that has been bought in a store and later repaired may be entered.
6. Effective strain relief should be provided for all wire to terminal connections. Knots, clamps, connectors, or staples are acceptable when used appropriately.
7. A class champion will be selected for each individual class and one Grand and one Reserve Champion rosette selected from the entire exhibit.

### LOT 6025 – 4-H WOOD SCIENCE

Reference materials include the Ky. 4-H Wood Science Plans Notebook and the 4-H CCS Woodworking Wonders guides.

An exhibitor may enter only one Wood Science class per year.

Each exhibit must be accompanied by a completed Wood Science Information Card (4JC-01SO)

Class Champions will be selected in each class and Grand Champion and Reserve Champion selected overall.

- 674 Level 1, **made from a kit.** Simple items which have pre-cut and pre-drilled parts and youth demonstrate

- knowledge of selection and use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes. (Example: small bird house, non-hopper bird feeder).
- 675 Level 1, **NOT from a kit.** Simple constructed wood item showing knowledge of hand tools, wood selection, cutting, drilling, use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes, (such as, napkin holder, letter holder, simple picture frame, wire wiggly, towel holder, serving tray, jewelry box, small flag holder, 4-H book ends, airplane, hurricane lamp, trivet (pot holder), etc.)
- 676 Level 2, **made from a kit.** More elaborate items which require cutting, drilling and youth demonstrate knowledge of selection and skill in use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes (Example: pine wood car, large bird house).
- 677 Level 2, **NOT from a kit.** More elaborate items that demonstrate a mastered skills with hand tools, basic knowledge of power hand tools, fastening options, appropriate surface preparations, and finish applications, (such as puzzle, foot stool, revolving tie rack, 4-H key holder, cutting board, book rack, serving dish shelf, sawhorse, hopper type bird feeder, etc.)
- 678 Level 3, **NOT from a kit.** Items showing a more advanced knowledge of power tools, expertise in cutting, fitting, surface preparation, attention to fastening details, and finish application, (such as a multi-purpose box, corner shelf, book shelf or laminated wood projects, garden bench, planting box, nail and tool box, shop tool rack & shelf, etc.)
- 679 Level 4, **NO kits.** Exhibits with a "furniture" quality finish, showing an understanding of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items showing a mastery of joint construction and use of special woods, and finishes. (Examples, checker boardroom divider, coffee table, end table, chest of drawers, gun rack or cabinet, etc.).
- 680 Level 4, **NO kits.** Exhibits that do not have a fine finish (painted finish allowable) because of practical use. Items demonstrate knowledge of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items showing mastery of cutting, drilling, joint construction, use of special woods, and appropriate finishes. (Examples, porch swing, chaise lounge, picnic table, lawn chair, large planters, etc.).

## ECOLOGY, NATURAL RESOURCES LOT 6026 – ENTOMOLOGY

### Specifications for exhibits:

- a. All exhibits are to be standard size 18" x 24" and not more than 3 1/2" thick with Plexiglass cover and cellotex type false pinning bottoms. Entomology boxes through UK College of Agriculture, Department of Entomology, will also be acceptable. Plastic wrap must be placed over insects in the styrofoam, cardboard or chipboard boxes. Boxes must be easily opened.
- b. Specimens are to be arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally. Whenever possible, 4-H'ers should attach wires to the back of boxes to help

- c. Identification labels available from your County Extension Office must be used. The card should be placed on the front of the box (each box). Instructions for pinning and labeling are included in your project literature.
- d. One half of the specimens may be from the previous year's collection or from anywhere in the United States; one half or more must be Kentucky insects collected since the last Kentucky State Fair.
- e. For the first through fifth year projects, a display collection catalog must be in an envelope attached to the back of the display box. Envelopes should be attached to permit their being opened easily to remove catalogue from them without moving the exhibit.

Entomology exhibits are judged on the following categories: Orders, Species, Common Names, Labels, Condition of Specimens, Overall Appearance, Life Cycle Representation, Catalog of Specimens. Check with county 4-H Agent for point distribution on score sheet.

Exhibits will be penalized if they do not:

- a. Use insect pins for pinning insects.
- b. Use the 4-H Entomology identification labels.
- c. Use the standard 18" x 24" x 3 1/2" display box or box acquired through the Dept. of Entomology. (Boxes from the Entomology Dept. should have a plastic film cover such as Saran Wrap to protect insects inside.)
- d. Fulfill the requirements of the particular exhibit under which it is entered.
- e. Have the insects arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally.
- f. Have the display collection catalogue in an envelope attached to the back of the display box through fifth year projects.

No extra credit will be given for specimens exhibited beyond the numbers listed in the current project books.

4-H'ers entering fifth year cannot use the same exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair.

4-H Entomology exhibits will be divided into the following classes:

- 687 First year project (1 or 2 boxes with minimum of 25 insects, maximum 50 insects, from at least four orders. Identification beyond order not necessary. All specimens must have date and locality label.)
- 688 Second year project (1 or 2 boxes with minimum of eight orders and not less than 50 insects, nor more than 100 insects.) Half of the insects should be identified with a common name.
- 689 Third year project ( 2 boxes with a minimum of 10 orders and 100 insects, a maximum of 150 insects.)
- 690 Fourth year project ( 2 boxes with minimum of 12 orders and 150 insects, no maximum) A third box with an example of insect damage, the stage of the insect causing the damage and any other stage of the insect that helps identify the problem. Include information in the display that tells how the insect is controlled. Life cycle of two insects may be displayed if desired.
- 691 Fifth year project (may be repeated for successive years of eligibility but must be a different exhibit. No exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair may be entered.) Any type of display that

pertains to experiences beyond those of previous projects. Special collections of native and/or exotic butterflies, beetles to some other insect order; a study in depth of one insect or small group of insects: a display of insect camouflage: a display of plastic embedded insects: a collection of insect larvae and nymphs are examples. Charts, photographs, models or any other visual aids may be used. 4-H'ers are encouraged to write a short (1 or 2 paragraphs) statement developing the theme of their fifth year display.

### Honey

Honey will show better in oval, flat sided to square clear glass containers. 4-H'ers **must** use standard honey jars. **Except class 696, wide-mouth mason jars or wide-mouth honey jars may be used.** The jars and lids must be **clean**. **Fill jars to within ½ inch of top.** **Note: Two jars must be submitted for the following classes.**

- 692 Two one pound containers of white extracted honey
- 693 Two one pound containers of light amber extracted honey
- 694 Two one pound containers of amber extracted honey
- 695 Two one pound containers of dark amber extracted honey
- 696 Two wide mouth quart jars of chunk honey, any color.

### LOT 6027 – 4-H FORESTRY

Only one entry per 4-H member permitted. Exhibitors are not to exceed the number of specimens listed for each class. If an exhibitor exceeds these numbers, the entry will be judged for blue, red and white ribbons, but will not be considered for top awards. If exhibit contains less than the correct number, it will be disqualified.

#### FIRST YEAR

- 703 Leaf Collections  
Collection of 10 leaves representing 10 forest trees found in Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I - Introducing Yourself to Trees" (**4DF-01PA or most recent version**) Activity #1 are to be followed.
- 704 Leaf Print Collection  
Collect and print 10 leaves representing 10 forest trees found in Kentucky. Instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I - Introducing Yourself to Trees" (**4DF-01PA or most recent version**) Activity #3 are to be followed.

#### SECOND YEAR

- 705 Leaf Collection-2nd year  
Collection of 20 leaves representing 20 forest trees and **different from ones done by same exhibitor in first year project** found in Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I - Introducing Yourself to Trees" (**4DF-01PA or most recent version**) Activity #1 are to be followed.
- 706 Educational Exhibit  
Develop a creative educational exhibit on some phase of forestry. The exhibit may utilize any visual technique. The total exhibit is not to exceed dimensions of 2' x 2', or four (4) square feet.

#### THIRD YEAR AND OVER

- 707 Educational Exhibit

Develop a creative educational exhibit on some phase of forestry. The exhibit may utilize any visual technique. The total is not to exceed dimensions of 3'x3', or nine (9) square feet.

- 708 Stem, Leaf, Fruit display  
Collect and mount 5 stems, leaves and fruit representing 5 forest trees found in Kentucky. **Follow closely the instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I - Introducing Yourself to Trees" (4DF-01PA or most recent version)** Activity #2 is to be followed, including the 2' x 3' **exact** size.

### LOT 6028 – GEOLOGY

- Only one entry per 4-H member permitted in Geology. Only one entry per county per project year. 4LO-11S0 Identification Card should be securely attached to the lower right hand corner of the front of the box.
- Display boxes must be no less than 16" no more than 20" vertically and no less than 22" no more than 24" horizontally. All boxes must have Plexiglas cover that can be easily removed for judging.
- Locks: If you wish your exhibit to remain locked during County Fair exhibition, attach a key to box with your name and county firmly attached to key. Key will be returned to 4-H agent. Keep another key in case County Fair key is misplaced.
- Hinges and Locks: Make flush or mount on sides or top of boxes so boxes will sit level.
- Fabric: If fabric is used, use a fabric glue to adhere entire piece of fabric to box. Suggested fabrics are felt or velveteen.
- Rocks: Should be firmly attached to the box, and should be numbered to correspond with the number on the Geology Identification Labels. (4DB-01SO)
- Boxes will be displayed on their side, not flat. Therefore, larger specimens must be attached near the lower portion of the box. Geology Identification Labels (4DB-01SO) available from the County Extension Agent for 4-H are the only labels acceptable. Circle whether found or purchased or obtained otherwise and state where found or purchased. (If you circle found, you are indicating you personally found the specimen.)
- Exhibits will be disqualified for class champion if:
  - a. Box does not fit in the size stated in rule 5
  - b. Box contains too few or too many specimens
  - c. Box does not have a Plexiglas cover that can be opened
  - d. Label does not state whether rocks are found or purchased, and state where found or purchased.
  - e. Specimen is mounted jewelry
  - f. Specimen is mounted and polished
  - g. Specimen and label are not numbered
  - h. Specimens are not arranged in numerical order
  - i. Duplicate specimens are used to reach minimum number
- The following score card will be used to judge geology exhibits:
  - a. Correct identification and labeling - 5 points for each specimen
  - b. Cards properly mounted and easily seen - 1 point for each specimen
  - c. Neatness, arrangements, background - 20 points for total exhibit
  - d. Method of collection - 1 point extra for each rock collected on site by 4-H'ers and identified as being collected on site
- Class champion will be selected in each class with a Grand

Champion and Reserve Grand Champion selected from Class Champions.

4-H'ers entering fifth year and up cannot enter the same exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair.

**Purchased items must be identified as such.**

**Classes are:**

- 714 Fossils - a collection of 15 fossils. (Up to a maximum of 20 will be accepted.) May be completed by any 4-H'er regardless of what year in geology project, but must include different fossils each year.
- 715 First year geology - consisting of 15 different specimens.
- 716 Second year Geology - consisting of 25 different specimens (up to 12 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)
- 717 Third Year Geology - consisting of 35 different specimens (up to 17 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)
- 718 Fourth Year Geology - consisting of 50 different specimens (up to 25 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)
- 719 Special collection for fifth year or more members - creative, advanced display of member's choosing which depicts a geological process, theme, story, or manufacturing process. Posters, notebooks and written narratives may be included.

#### HEALTH, PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, RELATIONSHIPS LOT 6029 – ARTS AND CRAFTS

Each Exhibitor may enter only two (2) classes.

**All items must have been made since the last State Fair.**

Entries must be accompanied by an information card for 4-H Arts & Crafts (4LO-14SA) and 4-H identification card (4LO-11SO) both of which are available from Agricultural Distribution Center. Tags (4LO-11SO) must be attached to the lower right front corner of paintings, drawings, etc. For other exhibits, neatly secure the ID card where it can be seen by the public with tape, or punch a hole in the corner of the tag and attach with string or rubber band. For items with more than one piece, a description on the back of the ID card is suggested with number of pieces, color, etc. In addition, label each item in an inconspicuous location; include a minimum of name and county (clothing label 4LO-12SO may be utilized).

Exhibits will be disqualified if:

- Pictures or other hanging items do not have an **attached** hanger (wire hangers attached to the frame for paintings and drawings only). **No wire hooks taped to back. All hangers must support the weight of item.** Pictures should be framed and ready for hanging.
- Pictures are not mounted on firm **mat**, not foam core and/or framed **with attached hanger. No poster board allowed.**
- Entries are not labeled as to whether they are an original design, made from a pattern, or made from a purchased kit
- If subject matter is not "family friendly" in context
- Drawings and paintings must be framed.**

Small items, which are easily separated or destroyed, may be placed in small plastic bags. For items with more than one piece, a description on the

back of the ID card is

suggested with number of pieces, color, description, etc. In addition, label each piece in an inconspicuous location include a minimum of name and county (the clothing label can be utilized [4LO-12SO]).

Reserve and Grand Champion will be selected from class champions in both the junior and senior categories.

Division A – Craft Classes are:

- 727 Junior Jewelry Beadwork – One piece of jewelry created by youth (Jewelry quality only). No kits or pony beads allowed. Glass, clay or wooden beads (painted or carved) permitted only
- 728 Senior Jewelry Beadwork – One set (at least two items) of jewelry created by youth (Jewelry quality only). No kits or pony beads allowed. Glass, clay or wooden beads (painted or carved) permitted only. Examples: earring(s) and necklace; bracelet and necklace, etc.)
- 729 Junior Folk Art – One Item that has paint for a decorative or craft purpose other than canvas or paper. No Clothing! The following items only will be accepted in this category: Stool, gourd, or small box (any shape).
- 730 Senior Folk Art - same as above.
- 731 Junior Weaving – One pair of place-mats, pot holders (pair) or one small wall hanging items that are made through various weaving techniques using mix media fibers, no plastic materials allowed. Baskets are not included. Wall hangings must be mounted and be ready for hanging.
- 732 Senior Weaving – One item (only one item is permitted for entry) ; rug, belt, stool with woven seat, or wall hanging item made through various weaving techniques using mixed media fibers, no plastic materials allowed. Baskets are not included. Wall hangings must be mounted and be ready for hanging.
- 733 Junior Nature Crafts – Wall Wreath made from natural materials only. **No kits allowed.** Must include wire or hooks and be ready for hanging. (no other item allowed)
- 734 Senior Nature Crafts –Wall Wreath, or hand carved native materials made from natural materials only. **No kits allowed.** Must include wire or hooks and be ready for hanging. (no other item allowed)
- 735 Junior Basket Making - Natural materials, any size, shape or design. Non-natural materials may be woven into design.
- 736 Senior Basket Making - same as above
- 737 Junior Leather Craft - Item made from leather. May or may not be tooled. Kits allowed.
- 738 Senior Leather Craft - same as above. No kits allowed.
- 739 Junior Decorative Clothing – Any item of clothing with added design materials such as painting, iron-on design, appliqué, buttons, jewels, decorative stitches, etc. **\*\*Not a State Fair Contest.**
- 740 Senior Decorative Clothing – same as above. **\*\*Not a State Fair Contest.**

The following rules apply to all ceramic classes:

Original design ceramics will be accepted in that class only. It will not be accepted in glazed or stained classes. **Must be fired.**

Small items, which are easily separated or destroyed, should be placed in small plastic bags. For items with more than one

piece, a description on the back of the ID card is suggested with number of pieces, color, etc. In addition, label each item in an inconspicuous location, include a minimum of name and county (the clothing label can be utilized (4LO-12SO).

741 Junior Original Design Ceramics – original item made from clay, using a process of casting, hand molding, or a potter's wheel.

742 Senior Original Design Ceramics – same as above.

Division B – Fine Art Classes:

Exhibits will be disqualified if:

a. Pictures or other hanging items do not have a hanger. **Please include hangers that will support the weight of your item. Pictures should be framed and ready for hanging.**

b. Pictures are not mounted on firm mat board and/or framed. No poster board allowed.

c. Subject matter is not "family friendly"

All drawings and paintings must be mounted on a sturdy background (mat board) and framed, ready to hang with secured hangers on the frame (wire hangers).

743 Junior Acrylic/Oil Painting - items that are made through the process of painting on paper or canvas, using any acrylic or oil process. Paint-by-number will be disqualified. No kits, original work only.

744 Senior Acrylic/Oil Painting - same as above.

745 Junior Watercolor Painting - items that are made through the process of painting on paper or canvas, using any watercolor process.

746 Senior Watercolor Painting - same as above.

747 Junior Color Drawing - items made through the use of drawing lines using pen, pencil, pastel, charcoal, markers or chalk.

748 Senior Color Drawing - same as above.

749 Junior Black and White Drawing - items made through the use of drawing lines using pen, pencil, charcoal, markers or chalk. No additional colors added.

750 Senior Black and White Drawing - same as above.

**(The following items are not eligible for State Fair)**

#### LOT 6030 – 4-H PHOTOGRAPHY

Specifications for exhibits:

**(Those not meeting specifications listed below will be disqualified)**

a. Each county may have one (1) entry per class in both general photography and horticulture photography.

b. General photography (levels 1 & 2): a 4-H'er can enter only 3 classes within one level per year, (includes classes 760 through 778).

c. Horticulture photography: a 4-H'er may enter any of the classes in addition to general photography.

d. All pictures must be made since the last State Fair.

e. Photos may be either Black & White or Color unless otherwise stated.

f. Digital images may be submitted in all classes, unless otherwise stated.

**g. ALL CLASSES (including Horticulture) WITH ONE PHOTOGRAPH MUST BE MOUNTED ON 10" x 16" MAT BOARD-available via order entry (no poster board or foamcore board accepted). Single photographs are limited to maximum size of 8" x 12".**

**h. ALL CLASSES (including Horticulture) WITH MULTIPLE PHOTOGRAPHS (MORE THAN ONE PHOTOGRAPH) MUST BE MOUNTED ON 16" x 20" MAT BOARD (no poster board or foamcore board accepted).**

i. Each picture must be mounted securely. Rubber cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. **DO NOT** use photo mounting corners.

j. Pictures may be cropped (trimmed).

k. All mounted entries must include: Lot, Class, and Entry number; Name and County. Use only current entry identification tag (4LO-11SO) on **white card stock only** and mount securely to front of the mat board in the **LOWER RIGHT CORNER**. Note: **Identification tag should NOT cover photo or hang over edge of the board.**

l. Absolutely nothing on front of mat board except photographs and ID tag. Any other required materials are to be mounted on the back.

m. All photographic entries are **required to have sticky-back Velcro ("hook" Velcro only)** in each of the four corners on the back of the mat board for easier exhibiting. The "loop"/smooth Velcro is not necessary and leaving it off will minimize hanging preparation time by judges. Photography will be judged on, but not limited to: Technical, impact, composition, creativity, presentation, sequence or collection.

**LEVEL 1** Purpose of this level is to promote Life Skills in the area of Communication, Workplace Competencies, and Foundation Skills through photography.

760 Single photograph; subject: a hobby

761 Sequence of three photographs; subject: a hobby

762 Single photograph; subject: still life (arrangement of inanimate objects. Definition of inanimate: nonliving things; something that never was alive, like a rock, buttons, a collection of toys,

- etc.)  
 763 Single photograph; subject: animals  
 764 Collection: Three different points of view of the same subject  
 765 My Community: Single photograph of a interesting building within your community (Photo size is limited to maximum of 8" x 12")  
 766 Five photographs of an event. Attach a description of the event to back of board.

*A Class Champion will be named in each class. Grand and Reserve Champions will be selected from class champions in Level 1.*

**LEVEL 2** – Purpose of this level is to promote Life Skills in the area of Communication, Workplace Competencies and Foundation Skills through photography.

- 770 Five photographs showing movement  
 771 Single photograph; subject: person (photographic portrait of an individual)  
 772 Single photograph; subject: landscape [definition of a landscape: a picture representing a view of natural inland scenery (a portion of land which the eye can comprehend in a single view, including mountains, rivers, lakes, and whatever the land contains--trees, flowers, grasses, etc.)]  
 773 Collection: Three to five photographs of the same subject  
 774 My Community: Single photograph (your choice of subject) within your community  
 775 My Community: Tell a story about your community with 3-5 photographs.  
 776 My Community: Collage of photographs (unlimited number of photos) on the subject of "My Community". Size of each individual photograph shall be no smaller than a minimum 3.5"x 5" and no larger than a maximum 8" x 12".  
 777 Digital Collage: multiple images cropped, resized and combined into one digital image 8" x 12" print (recommend 180-360dpi).  
 778 Digital illustration – Single heavily edited 8" x 12" digital image. Image has been radically digitally edited or enhanced. Modifications may include: cropping, sharpening or blurring, brightness or contrast changes, addition to or the removal of parts of the image, changes in the color scheme of the image, the use of filters or effects. **Attach to back of mat board: 1. A page describing editing technique(s) used. 2. A print of the ORIGINAL image.**

*A Class Champion will be named in each class. Grand and Reserve Champions will be selected from class champions in Level 2.*

#### **HORTICULTURAL PHOTOGRAPHY CLASSES**

**NJHA Contest:** Entries in the following classes may also participate in the National Junior Horticulture Association Photography Exhibition. It is the responsibility of the individual to submit all required entry forms and follow all rules set out by NJHA organization to participate. States are not limited in the number of entries. - 780 Single black and white. Horticultural subject or activity. (maximum size: 8" x 12")  
 781 Single color. Horticultural subject or activity. (maximum size: 8" x 12")  
 782 Sequence of 4 photographs. B&W or Color representing a horticultural event or activity that tells a visual story, chronologically, without the use of words.

- 783 Horticulture collection (B&W or color), consisting of 6 photographs.

*A Class Champion will be named in each class. A Grand and Reserve Champion will be selected from class champions in Horticulture Photography.*

#### **LOT 6032 – 4-H CLOTHING AND NON-CLOTHING SEWING**

Items must be **CLEAN** to be accepted for judging.

Send **NO additional** accessories or undergarment with any sewing entry unless it was constructed as a part of the project.

Label each item. Hand baste or securely safety pin **4LO-12SO clothing label** on inside of each article. **Securely pin the 4-H Sewing Project Card to the entry.**

Items must be "handmade"; no ready-to-wear/factory made **items** will be accepted for judging. An item accepted that does not meet the class requirements will be judged, but ribbon premium may be lowered. All projects must be accompanied by documentation (4-H Sewing Project Card). Junior Unit V non-clothing option requires additional documentation. **Creative Expressions & Wearable Art** projects may require additional information. An entry without documentation will not be considered for class champion and is subject to being awarded a lower premium.

In classes where there is to be specified number of articles to be exhibited and the entry contains more, the judges will be instructed to have the agent who submits the article(s) make the decision on which item(s) are to be judged. In those cases where the situation was not discovered before entry was made, the article(s) to be judged will be left to the discretion of the judges.

The definition of a "complete outfit" is an item or items that cover the top and bottom of the body. To be considered a top, a jacket or robe it must include a front closure. Open front tops that require an undershirt do not count unless the under shirt is also constructed.

A prize is being awarded to the best project made from wool fabric. Dorothy Vale, Coordinator for the Kentucky Make It With Wool Contest is offering a length of Pendleton Wool to the winner. Any sewing project may be made from wool fabric, woven or knit. Those wishing to compete for this prize should attach a 3 inch square sample swatch for fiber content verification to their project card. Fabric should be at least 60% wool to be eligible. Test fabric before construction: Place a 1" fabric square in 1 cup NEW Clorox bleach. 100% wool will begin to disintegrate within 1 hour and should have no residue after several hours. Wool blends will have fibers remaining. Note: Fabric finishes and other natural fibers may affect the test results. Sewing entries will be divided into the following classes:

#### **Junior (Ages 9-13) BEGINNING**

Unit I – Let's Learn to Sew

Entry-level exhibit must be made from woven fabric and include straight machine stitching and a casing.

- 790 Clothing Option: Shorts, pants, or skirt with casing waistline (elastic and/or

- drawstring).
- 791 Non Clothing Option: Drawstring tote bag, purse, or laundry bag.
- Unit II – Let’s Get to the Bottom  
Exhibit must be made from woven fabric and must have enclosed seams, interfacing, and zipper.
- 792 Clothing Option: Skirt, shorts or pants with zipper and a waistband or facing.
- 793 Non Clothing Option: Tote bag, purse, or gym bag with zipper and self-fabric straps or handles.

Unit III – Top it Off  
Intermediate level exhibit must be made from woven fabric and include buttons and buttonholes, may include a simple lining, trim, collar, and sleeves.

- 794 Clothing Option: Shirt, simple jacket, one piece dress with no waistline, cape with a hood or collar, bathrobe, or vest with lining or facing. Project must include buttons and buttonholes.
- 795 Non Clothing Option: Backpack with lining, applied trim, and button/buttonhole closure.

Unit IV – Stretch Your Knit Skills

Intermediate level exhibit must be made from a stable knit fabric with limited amount of stretch any include rib knit for trim only.

- 796 1 or 2 piece complete outfit such as a dress, top and bottom, pajamas, or nightshirt.

Unit V – Put it All Together

Advanced level exhibit combining previously learned and newly acquired skills to construct a coordinating ensemble.

- 797 Clothing Option: 2 or 3 piece complete coordinating outfit; such as warm up suit; dress with jacket or coat, swimwear with cover-up, jacket or shirt with slacks/skirt. At least one piece must include sleeves and a collar/hood. No simple casings. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two.

- 798 Non Clothing Option: Using Wild Ginger Software, Inc. **Wild Things!** Software program, select the Tote Bag option and design a bag that includes at least 2 pockets. Minimum size requirement for the tote bag is 12 inches in height and 12 inches in width. Be creative with your design.

**Other requirements:** at least one functional zipper must be included in your design and creative stitchery or applied trim to personalize your bag. Optional elements: lining, other type closure as design dictates [button(s), hook and loop tape, or snap(s)]. If bag is not lined, it is suggested that the seam allowances be finished with a bound seam finish. Written documentation will need to include the printed design sheets (one for each pocket selected) from the program and answers to the following questions:

1. How did you choose the size of your tote bag? Did you use any of the default settings in the program?
2. Did you have any trouble using the software or printing your pattern? Explain
3. Did you download the Wild Things! Program to your home computer or use the program at your county extension office?
4. Did you make any changes to your pattern after it was printed? If so, tell what you changed.

Senior (Ages 14-19)

## INTERMEDIATE SEWING – LEVEL 1

Let’s be Casual

- 799 Clothing Option: 1 or 2 piece complete outfit made from knit or woven fabric such as a dress, top and bottom, simple pajamas, or robe.
- 800 Non Clothing Option: 2 coordinating fashion accessories from the following: wallet, garment bag, purse, backpack or duffel bag. At least one piece must have a zipper.

Dress it Up

- 801 1 or 2 piece complete dressy outfit, such as a dress, suit, pantsuit, sport coat and slacks. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two.

Match it Up

- 802 Clothing Option: Choose at least one item from each group to make a complete 3 or 4 piece coordinated outfit:

- Shorts, pants, or skirt
- Top, blouse, shirt
- Vest, jacket, sweater

At least one piece is required to have regulation set in sleeves. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two. An accessory item may be included as the fourth piece.

- 803 Non Clothing Option: 3 or 4 piece coordinating luggage/travel accessories set. Each piece must have an applied border/trims, pocket and zipper.

Creative Expressions

- 804 Clothing Option: Construct a complete outfit for one of the following activities:

- Halloween, theater, or historic costume
- Uniform for medical, cheerleader, dancer, etc.
- Riding apparel

**Additional documentation is required.** Include the following information: Purpose for the garment, reason for choosing, and any alterations made to individualize the pattern. This information can be written on the 4-H Sewing Project Card that accompanies the garment.

- 805 Non Clothing Option: Select one of the following and construct a:

- Fabric doll or animal with a wardrobe of two outfits
- Machine appliquéd specialty flag or decorative banner (minimum size 24 inches x 24 inches)

**Additional documentation is required.** Include the following information: Purpose for the item and reason for choosing. This information can be written on the 4-H Sewing Project Card that accompanies the item. If a flag/banner is chosen, include design plan/drawing.

## ADVANCED SEWING – LEVEL 2

Leisure Time

- 806 Clothing Option: 2 or 3 piece complete outfit.

Choose from the following:

- Athletic wear such as leotard, cycling wear, warm-up suit, bathing suit and cover-up, tennis wear
- Pajamas and robe (must use specialty fabric such as terry cloth, flannel, fleece, nylon tricot)
- Raincoat and hat or rain suit

- 807 Non Clothing Option:

- Kite (minimum size 2ft x 3 ft)

Formal Affair

- 808 1 or 2 piece complete outfit, such as a prom dress, bridesmaid dress, or tuxedo. Fabric choice may be

woven, knit or a combination of the two.

#### Tailor Made

809 Suit, jacket, or coat, made from 100% wool or a least 60% wool blend fabric.

Traditional or speed tailoring techniques must be used to create structure in the areas of the neck, shoulder, and hemlines. **Do not include non-wool/wool blend coordinates.**

#### Wearable Art

810 A complete **sewn** outfit consisting of 1 to 3 pieces. Garment pieces may include dress, vest, jumper, jacket, pants, skirt, or blouse/shirt. At least one piece must include some sort of fabric manipulation or embellishment. In addition, coordinating accessories may also be included such as hats, scarves, ties, or shawls. If accessories are included they must also include embellishment.

**Additional documentation is required.** Include how the design was created, time involved, and any design drawings that were used in the creation.

### LOT 6033 – 4-H NEEDLEWORK DEPARTMENT

Each category (division) will be broken down into the following classes:

- Young Junior* - Ages 9 to 11
- Beginner* - All ages; refers to skill level
- Intermediate* - All ages; refers to skill level
- Advanced* - All ages; refers to skill level

Entries are limited to an individual entering one class per category (division) per project year.

Each county may have two entries per class per project year. Each item must be accompanied with a **Project Card**. See County Agent and/or 4-H Needlework Notebook/CD for additional information. Secure with safety pin to the inside of the item.

All items must have the 4-H ID tag (4LO-11SO) attached to each item that is entered.

Item(s) must be clean to be accepted for judging. Previous wearing/using is acceptable (and strongly encouraged!), but item must be clean.

An item will not “knowingly” be accepted for judging if it does not meet the category description. Any item not meeting the project requirements will be judged, but will not be considered for class champion.

Items entered must be completed by the exhibitor within the current project year.

Additional documentation **may** be required. Refer to the specific project for details. A copy of the pattern used must accompany project if pattern is not from the Kentucky 4-H Needlework Notebook. Please label pattern with entrant’s name and county and attach to exhibit. Patterns will be returned in county packets.

#### CROCHET

813 Young Junior: Here We Go, Row by Row! (Ages 9 to 11)

Exhibit one item using single or double crochet stitches with 4-ply worsted weight yarn. Options include: scarf, purse, belt, hat.

814 Beginner: Here We Go, Around and Around!

Exhibit one item, pair of items, or set using single and/or double crochet stitches. May use yarn other than 4-ply worsted weight. May include increase/decrease stitches. Options include: purse, scarf, vest, shawl, small afghan, lap wrap.

815 Intermediate: Here We Go, Patterns Galore!

Exhibit one item, pair of items, or set using intermediate skills and one or more pattern stitches.

816 May include increase/decrease stitches. Can include one or more colors in alternating rows (stripes). Suggested items include: sweater, vest, shawl, mittens, hat, baby blanket, set of 5 different ornaments made with bedspread-weight thread. Advanced: From There to Here, Anything Goes! Exhibit one item or pair of items that includes advanced skills listed in the member’s project guide. Advanced skills listed in the project guide are: afghan stitch, beadwork, camel crochet, filet crochet, Irish crochet, Kro-knit/Hook, Kro-tat, Hairpin Lace, or broomstick lace. Combining pattern stitches with crocheted buttons and/or buttonholes, creating plaids, geometric designs or checks, making novelty crochet articles or creating your own design. Original designs must include a copy of directions, notes and diagrams used to create the items(s). Suggested items include: sweater, jacket, coat, multi-colored hat, purse, collar (made with bedspread-weight cotton thread).

#### EMBROIDERY

All projects are to be a completed item (examples: framed piece, pillow, wall hanging, pot holder, eyeglass holder, etc.) or can be created on a purchased item. (Example: pillowcase, clothing, tote bag, purse, bib, dishtowel, etc.) Items may be made from purchased kits that meet the individual project guidelines.

817 Young Junior: Begin Embroidery

Exhibit one of the following:

- Item of red work (red floss on white or unbleached plain woven fabric). Must include stem stitch and have minimum embroidered area of 4-x 4-inches.
- Item of cross stitch—1/4-inch checked gingham and have a minimum embroidered area of 4 x 4 inches.
- Item of cross stitch with stamped design on plain woven fabric and have a minimum embroidered area of 4 x 4 inches.
- Item with a cross stitch border design on plain woven white fabric that has a minimum embroidered area of 2 x 8 inches.

818 Beginner: Embroidery 101

Exhibit one of the following:

- Item of red work (red floss on white or unbleached plain woven fabric). Must include stem stitch and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.
- Item of cross stitch on 1/4-inch gingham and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.
- Item of cross stitch with stamped design on white plain woven fabric and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.
- Item with a cross stitch border design on plain woven white fabric that has a minimum embroidered area of 2 x 16 inches.
- Item of Candlewicking on plain woven fabric. Must include colonial knots and have a minimum embroidered area of 7 x 7 inches.
- Item of free embroidery on plain woven fabric or felt. Must include 5 of the following different stitches (stem/outline, lazy daisy, running, straight, French knot, satin, blanket, chain, back stitch). Must use 3 or more colors of floss and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.

- Item of snowflake embroidery (Chicken Scratch) on ¼ inch or smaller checked gingham. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.
- 819 Intermediate: More Embroidery 201  
Exhibit one of the following:
- Item of free embroidery on plain woven fabric. Must include minimum of 6 different embroidery stitches with 3 or more colors of embroidery floss. Must have minimum embroidered area of 7 x 9 inches.
  - Item of counted cross stitch on 11 or 14 count Aida cloth or other fabric using waste canvas. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 3 x 3 inches.
  - Item of huck embroidery on huck toweling creating a minimum 2 inch wide border design.
  - Item of huck embroidery (Swedish weaving) on monk's cloth with minimum embroidered area of 36 x 36 inches.

- 820 Advanced: Creative Embroidery 301  
Exhibit one of the following:
- Item of counted cross stitch on smaller than 14 count even weave or Aida cloth. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.
  - Item of crewel embroidery on linen or cotton twill fabric using crewel or Persian yarn. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 6 x 8 inches.
  - Item created or embellished with silk ribbon embroidery using 5 or more embroidery stitches with silk ribbon. Design may also include embroidery floss.
  - Item constructed of irregularly shaped fabric pieces embellished with a combination of ribbon work, specialty thread, embroidery stitches, and/or beadwork creating a finished crazy quilt design.

Item of English Smocking, minimum smocked area 4 ½ x 6 ½ inches. Design must include at least 5 different smocking stitches.

#### KNITTING

- 821 Young Junior: Learn to Knit  
Exhibit one item or pair of items using 4-ply worsted weight yarn. Solid color or variegated yarn is acceptable. Items are limited to those that include garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch. Options include: slippers, mittens, hat, pillow, purse or scarf.
- 822 Beginner: Knit One, and Purl too!  
Exhibit one item or pair of items. May use yarn other than 4-ply worsted weight yarn. Two colors and one pattern stitch may be used in addition to garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch. Options include: hat, mittens, pillow, purse, scarf, slippers, small afghan/shawl.
- 823 Intermediate: Keep on Knitting!  
This project focuses on shape. Exhibit one item or a pair of items using pick up stitches, multiple color changes (stripes or duplicate stitch), and/or circular knitting. Item must include increase or decrease. May use yarns other than 4-ply worsted weight yarn. Suggested items include: gloves, hat, mittens, socks, sweater, vest.
- 824 Advanced: Knitter's Choice

This project focuses on texture and design. Exhibit one item or a pair of items using charted designs or design your own. Chartist designs may include color changes such as Fairisle knitting or multiple pattern stitches such as Aran Isle knitting or lace knitting. Knitting with beads is also acceptable. Original designs must include a copy of directions, notes, and any diagrams used to create the item. Suggested items include: afghan (minimum size 45-x 60-inches), holiday stocking (minimum 18-inches in length), purse, socks, sweater.

#### LACEWORK -- TATTING (Project will be changing in 2009)

**Young Junior:** Not available. 9-11 year olds may do project work, but it would be exhibited at the beginner, intermediate, or advanced level.

- 825 Beginner: Just a Tatter  
Exhibit one of the following items: hand towel with edging, pillowcase with edging, or handkerchief with edging (motif made with stitches which are repeated), or simple motif as embellishment on clothing or other item.
- 826 Intermediate: Just a Ball and Shuttle  
Exhibit one of the following items using 2-threads: book mark, or piece of jewelry (no beadwork).
- 827 Advanced: Tatting and a Little More  
Exhibit one of the following items using 2- threads and beads: jewelry, advanced motif as embellishment on clothing or other items.

#### NEEDLEPOINT

**Young Junior:** Not available. 9-11 year olds may do project work, but it would be exhibited at the beginner, intermediate, or advanced level.

- 828 Beginner: Get to the Point  
Exhibit one of the following: item with minimum finished size of 5-inches square, pin cushion using tent stitches and two or more colors, or purchased kit meeting project guidelines.
- 829 Intermediate: A Stitch at a Time  
Exhibit one of the following using three or more colors: personalized (name or initials) belt, 9-inch square (minimum finished size) sampler using a minimum of four decorative stitches one of which may be a tent stitch – can be framed or finished as a pillow, patterned pin cushion (6-inch square minimum finished size), or purchased kit meeting project guidelines.
- 830 Advanced: Patient Stitching Block by Block  
Exhibit one of the following items using three or more colors:
- 12-inch square (minimum size) item using 4-H design or design of your choice with tent stitch and one or more decorative stitch(es), sampler using a minimum of 6 stitches (Project may be finished into a pillow, a foot stool, chair seat, framed as a picture or other item of choice.), or purchased kit meeting project guidelines.

Exhibit one rectangle placemat with fringed edges; finish size 12- x 18-inches
- 832 Beginner: Machine Quilting—Pillow Talk  
Exhibit one 14- x 14-inch square rag pillow (quilting required on one side).
- 833 Intermediate: Machine Quilting—Quilt as You Go

Exhibit one of the following items that are made by piecing and quilting as you go using either the sew and flip method or quilting squares prior to piecing:

- 24 x 24-inch (minimum finished size) pieced and machine quilted item. Suggestions: baby quilt, tree skirt, lap quilt, wall hanging
- Two 14-inch squares (minimum) to make a completed project. Suggestions: tote, pillow, chair pad, placemat, etc

835 Young Junior: *Let’s Learn to Hand Quilt*  
Exhibit one hand quilted 8-inch square hot pad.

836 Beginner: *Hand Quilting—Pillow Talk*  
Exhibit one hand quilted 14-inch patchwork pillow.

837 Intermediate: *Hand Quilting—Piecing It Together*  
Exhibit one hand quilted 24 x 24-inch (minimum size) pieced item any shape. Suggested items include: wall-hanging, baby quilt, tree skirt, lap quilt.

838 Advanced: *Stitch it Down by Hand*  
Exhibit one hand quilted and hand appliquéd item (any size). Suggested items include: holiday stocking, tree skirt, wall-hanging, quilt.

**LOT 6035 – 4-H FOODS EXHIBITS**

Use label **(4LO-11SO)**. Properly fill out and attach label securely to the outside wrapper and the container of each food **(it is suggested that food be brought in zip lock bag, except food preservation items)**. To prevent damage, cakes should be transported in cardboard boxes. **Do not send food in any container that should be returned to exhibitor. Only Food Preservation jars will be returned.**

Entries are limited to two per county per class. Each exhibitor may enter three (3) classes in the same level, but is limited to one (1) Food Exhibit, one (1) Poster, and one (1) Food Preservation class. Exhibitor may not enter one class in level A, another class in level B, and another class in level C. The decision of the judges is final.

Entries are to be made using recipes in the 4-H Cooperative Curriculum Service (4HCCS) project manuals or go to [www.Kentucky4-H.org](http://www.Kentucky4-H.org), click on State Fair, then scroll down to State Fair Foods/Nutrition Recipes.

One class champion will be named in each class. One overall grand and one reserve champion will be named from the class champions.

Posters should be prepared using the following guidelines:

- Attach 4LO-11SO Identification Card for 4-H securely to poster front, bottom right corner.
- Poster (matt board or foam core) size should be no wider than 22 inches and no longer than 28 inches. The use of pencil on the front of the poster is discouraged.
- The front of the poster should visually depict what was learned through the project.
- On the back of the poster, attach a one-page, one-side only narrative answering Kitchen Talk questions from 4HCCS project book.

**FOOD PRESERVATION**

Each jar must be labeled with official canning label. Labels are included in labeling instructions (State Fair Labels and Entry Form) distributed by the State 4-H Office. Indicate on label date product was canned. **Use labels updated after 2000.** Labeling Packaged items: Label **(4LO-11SO)**, properly filled out, should be attached securely to the outside container of each container. Foods in the frozen food categories should be in moisture – and – vapor-resistant containers designed for freezing. Include date of freezing. Place tape with ring or class number on top of jar. Food Preservation jars must be clear, clean STANDARD jars **specifically designed** for home canning. Mayonnaise jars and non-standard jars will be disqualified. Two-piece screw bands and lids specifically designed for home canning should be left on containers until entered at the fair. **Judges will remove screw bands for judging purposes.** Use correct canning method indicated in **You're the Chef, Foodworks**, University of Kentucky “Guide to Home Canning.” Jars not processed by the correct methods will be disqualified. Open kettle processing is not acceptable for any product. All food preservation entries must be prepared with raw products. Re-canning of commercially processed foods will be disqualified.

860 Level A: Six Easy Bites project book – Freezing Techniques – Package of four (4) baked Colossal cookies using appropriate freezing techniques (pg. 34-35)  
861 Level B: Tasty Tidbits project book–Drying

- Techniques – Twelve (12) banana chips using appropriate drying technique (pg. 46)

#### LOT 6039 – 4-H HOME ENVIRONMENT

The work on the entry must be done by the 4-H member since the **2007** State Fair. Only one class may be entered by exhibitor. Exhibit must be in the unit where the 4-Her is enrolled. Entries are limited to one per class. Exhibits entered in an inappropriate class will be judged but not considered for class champion.

*A class champion will be named in each class. Grand and reserve champion will be selected from the class champions.* Each entry must be properly labeled (label each piece in the entry). Only those entries that are properly labeled and documented will be considered for class champion. Safety pin the large tag to fabric articles. Safety pin small tags underneath hemline on curtains and bedspreads. Tape large tags in upper right-hand corner of solid articles. These labels are included in Labeling Instructions (see State Fair Labels and Entry Form) distributed by the State 4-H Office. Safety pin or securely attach to the exhibit:

- a. Score Card for 4-H Home Furnishings
- b. Any other specific documentation required for classes 897 or above.

The decision of the judges is final. Rods, pins and fixtures will be provided for use by County Fair for window treatment exhibits. Wall hangings must be ready to hang with appropriate hardware attached.

Table setting exhibit for Unit III must be packed to prevent breakage and loss. Each item in the display must be labeled. Packing box must be clearly labeled with exhibitor's name and county so that exhibit can be returned to box for county pick-up. No silverware please. We are not responsible for loss or breakage. Please make 4-H'ers aware of this when they select items for exhibit.

Refinished item refers to an item already in use which has been given a new finish of paint or a type of seal. Exhibits in Units III, IV, and Changing Spaces must include a one-page, front only narrative or the project will be DISQUALIFIED. For class champion, the narrative should be attached to the back of the poster. The plan/explanation/description is an integral part of a home environment project.

4-H Home Furnishings entries may be made in the following classes:

#### Unit I EXHIBITS

- 887 Color Collage - (**Select from** activity 3 from Unit I project book.) This must be mounted on mat board.
- 888 Texture Collage or Rubbing - (select from Activity 1 or 2 from Unit I project book). The collage must be mounted on mat board.
- 889 Natural finish (grain shows through) applied to small wood object with straight lines. **Judging emphasis will be on the finish, not the construction.** Examples include bowl, tray, cutting board, game board, and small box.
- 890 Simple, small cloth article (maximum size: 36" x 36") with no machine stitching. Examples include knotted

pillow (**no applied design**), draped valance with accompanying photo showing end result.

**Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.**

- 891 Simple, small article of cloth requiring machine stitching. Examples include plain pillow (no applied design), fringed tablecloth, place mats and napkins, laundry bag, valance. **Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.**

- 892 Wastebasket
- 893 Pin-up (bulletin) board

#### Unit II EXHIBITS

- 894 Refinished wood item. Should have straight lines with no elaborate carvings or turnings. Examples include footstool, children's furniture, small box, tray, picture frame, bookshelves, and plant stand.
- 895 Small article made of cloth. Examples include hemmed tablecloth or table runner, wall hanging, pillow, and flat hemmed curtains. **Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.**
- 896 Desk Set, including **three or more items.** Examples: blotter pad, pencil holder, letter box, **notebook, etc.**

#### Unit III EXHIBITS - ALL EXHIBITS MUST INCLUDE DOCUMENTATION SPECIFIED BELOW.

- 897 Accessory for the home with description, sketch, or photo to show how the accessory is used in the home and how the design and colors fit in with the other furnishings and color used in the home. Examples include stitchery or appliqué wall hanging, latch hook items, pillow with applied design (stitchery, appliqué or other media), rug, picture in appropriate frame and ready to hang.
- 898 Table setting, to include centerpiece, plate, beverage container(s) and table linen appropriate to theme or event chosen by 4-H member. No silverware, please. Information card accompanying exhibit must include specific theme or event for which the table setting was planned. A color photo of the place setting as to how it would appear on the table must be included. Items may or may not be made by the 4-H'er.
- 899 Refinished furniture (stripped, sanded, and stained, painted or varnished), with a "before" picture attached. Examples: rocker, table, large chair or chest.
- 900 Recycled or low cost furnishing item created as part of your decorating plan. Information card accompanying exhibit should include materials used, cost and time involved in project and final use for item.

#### Unit IV EXHIBITS - ALL EXHIBITS MUST INCLUDE BOTH ARTICLE AND DOCUMENTATION SPECIFIED BELOW.

- 901 An accessory for the home, made with member's original or adapted design and information card, which includes description of how and where item is used in the home. Examples include latch hook item; pillow with stitchery design; wall hanging of natural dyed yarns or drawing with mat and finished or refinished frame.
- 902 Heritage item refinished, restored, or made by the 4-H member with information on the history or meaning of the item to the member and how it is used in the home. Examples include antique or collectible furniture, memory box, scrap book of family history (**Note: Scrapbook needs to reflect family history/home/house/farm/land of three or more generations**), quilt with heritage design, wall hanging showing family tree.
- 903 Purchased article selected by 4-H member to solve a

home decorating problem. Exhibit must be accompanied by a folder describing problem to be solved, alternatives considered in the solution of the problem, how the plan was carried out, resources used (time, money) and member's evaluation of the results (satisfaction with purchased article, how article is used in the home). Photos illustrating the before and after effect are required. Examples include wall decoration, lamp, vase, storage item, desk accessories, bedspread, rug, table linens, pillow, and draperies. **A minimum of five one-sided pages must be provided.**

904 A cloth article made by the 4-H'er showing a major home improvement accompanied by a written description and picture/photo to show how project is used in home, other colors used in room, time and costs involved, and care required. Photos illustrating the before and after effect are required. Examples include bedspread, quilt, window treatment and boxed bench pad. **Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.**

905 Furniture, which has been, refinished, reupholstered, recovered, recycled, reused or remodeled. Exhibit to include article and information on original condition, work required in completing project, time and cost involved, and how item is used in home. **DO NOT INCLUDE NEWLY CONSTRUCTED FURNITURE.**

906 Design Experience. Exhibit could include a self-determined design experience including article(s) made or purchased by 4-H member. Examples include a plan for **redesigning** a room, an accessory item showing original design of 4-H member, notebook with pictures and descriptions of architectural styles used in Kentucky homes, or other design experience as they relate to the home.

907 Heritage Experience-Restoration of furnishings (could include caning, **reseating**, etc.), study of furniture styles, study of old buildings in community, learning a heritage or craft skill...especially from an older family member or friend. Exhibit must be accompanied by a folder listing the 4-H'er's objectives and what was done. Example, if an item was refinished or refurbished, include who it belonged to and the significance to the family. If a study was made of furniture styles, include pictures and history. If a study of buildings was done in the community, include slides or pictures describing the architectural significance, period of history, uses of the buildings. If it is a learned skill, exhibit the item made and describe how skill was learned, how interest was stimulated and how you will use item and skill.

908 Major Home Improvement. Exhibit must include information describing project, whether project was an individual project or a group or family project, skills learned by member, time and cost involved. Include before, during, and after photographs, if possible. Examples include storage item, notebook or folder describing or showing activities in do-it-yourself project (painting the house, wallpapering, basement remodeling.).

11 inches. Maximum size 11 x 17 inches. **Must be mounted on mat board, or foam core board.** Documentation should include answers to these questions: 1. Is the room you have drawn similar to a room in your house? What are its dimensions? How much square footage is in the room? 2. Did you have problems with the web site? If so, how did you solve them? 3. Tell about how you worked with the items in your room such as walls, windows, doors and furniture.

910 House Floor Plan

Use any software program to draw a house plan including bedroom(s), bath(s), living space, garage, door(s) and window(s). Print in color or black and white. Minimum size 8 ½ x 11 inches. Maximum size 11 x 17 inches. **Must be mounted on mat board or foam core board.** Documentation should include answers to these questions: 1. Does your floor plan resemble the house you live in? If not, did you look at other floor plans for inspiration? What type of roof does your house have? 2. How have you considered how a family member who is disabled (for instance, a wheelchair user) might get around in your home 3. Discuss any problems you had with the web site and how you solved them. Tell how you worked with additional items required to create a floor plan.

911 Presentation Board – Color Scheme: Using the Mississippi web site, ([http://msucares.com/4h\\_Youth/interior\\_design/index.html](http://msucares.com/4h_Youth/interior_design/index.html)) create a presentation board (color scheme only) for any room in the home. Actual fabric, wall, and floor samples are preferred; however, if you can not find any, you may use a web site to download color copies or substitute magazine or scrapbook paper to represent these items. Mat, or foam core board may be used. The white board should be 11 x 18 inches and the black board should be 13 x 20 inches.

912 Presentation Board – Bedroom: Using the Mississippi web site, ([http://msucares.com/4h\\_Youth/interior\\_design/index.html](http://msucares.com/4h_Youth/interior_design/index.html)) create a presentation board (color scheme and room template) for a bedroom. Fabric samples are preferred; however, if you cannot find any, you may use a web site to download color copies or substitute magazine or scrapbook paper to represent these items. Mat, or foam core board may be used. The white board should be 11 x 18 inches and the black board should be 13 x 20 inches.

913 Presentation Board – Great Room: Using the Mississippi web site, ([http://msucares.com/4h\\_Youth/interior\\_design/index.html](http://msucares.com/4h_Youth/interior_design/index.html)) create a presentation board (color scheme and room template) for a great room. Fabric samples are preferred; however, if you cannot find any, you may use a web site to download color copies or substitute magazine or scrapbook paper to represent these items. **LOT 6040 – SUPER SHOPPER: CONSUMER AND FINANCIAL EDUCATION**

Attach 4LO-11SO Identification Card for 4-H securely to poster front, bottom right corner. It must not protrude beyond edge of poster. Designate 4-H'ers age on Identification Card. (bold lettering) The Poster should be no wider than 22 inches and no longer than 28 inches. The use of pencil on the front of the poster is discouraged.

On back of poster securely attach a one-page, front only, narrative explaining how the decision making process was used to reach your final choice. Some factors to consider would be: price, safety, end use, size, appearance, relationship to management and consumer education. Judging criteria will be based on theme, poster design (lettering, attractiveness, conveys a message), and narrative provides explanation of poster and management process. Laminated narratives are helpful but not required. Also include a second copy of the narrative in a plastic sleeve so the narrative can be removed and attached next to the poster for display purposes at the County Fair. Include your name and county on both narrative sheets. The one-page narrative (8½"x 11") can be single or double spaced. Posters will be disqualified for class champion if they do not contain the narrative, are not typed or in ink, or do not conform to the listed topics. You are encouraged to list your research sources (individual and/or written) at the end of your narrative.

A 4-H'er may enter in only one class.

See General Rules applying to all 4-H exhibitors and general

rules applying to 4-H exhibits listed previously in this catalog.

1. A county is limited to one entry per class. A member may enter up to 3 classes within the Clover Division. (This means: a member's name could appear in the same level up to 3 times on the county's Clover Division invoice sheet.)
2. All items must have been made since the last State Fair.
3. Each exhibit must be properly labeled. Place ID tag (4LO-11SO) in the most visible place on the exhibit, preferably on the lower right-hand corner. Labels may be securely taped, attached with a rubber band through a hole in the corner or safety pinned (fabric items). To insure that all parts of the exhibit make it back to the county, "hide" a small label (with a minimum of the county name) on EVERY parts that might become separated from others; these should not be visible to the public when displayed.
4. All photography classes with one photograph must be mounted on 10"x 16" MAT BOARD-available via order entry (no poster board or foamcore board accepted). Single photographs are limited to up to a maximum size of 8"x 12".
5. Each picture must be mounted securely. Rubber cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. Do not use photo mounting corners.
6. All photographic entries are required to have sticky-back Velcro ("hook" Velcro only) in each of the four corners on the back of the mat board for easier exhibiting. The "loop"/smooth Velcro is not necessary and leaving it off will minimize hanging preparation time by judges.
7. All entries must follow the specifications and rules listed in their class in order to be named champion.
8. Junior division includes ages 9-13; Senior division includes ages 14-18.

Vintage Clover Sewing

1. Exhibit is limited to an apron created using a vintage pattern or design.
  2. Vintage patterns can be located on the web.
  3. Apron must be "handmade"; no ready-to-wear/factory made items will be accepted for judging.
  4. Exhibit may be machine or hand stitched.
  5. Exhibit may be youth or adult sized apron.

Historical 4-H Poster

1. Judging criteria will be based on implementation of the 4-H theme, 4-H historical content, poster design (lettering, attractiveness, how well it conveys the message), as well as the effectiveness of the poster to promote 4-H.
2. Exhibit must be completed on a standard full size poster board.
3. Posters may not include items or embellishments that make the poster 3-dimensional.
4. Any use of the 4-H Clover must adhere to the standards and guidelines of the registered 4-H clover.
5. Any color poster board is acceptable.

6. No foam board permitted.
7. Champion and Reserve Champion posters will not be returned and will become the property of Kentucky 4-H. The posters will be used to market Kentucky 4-H.
